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(1) DEBORAH KILLIAN,
(2) having been first duly sworn, was (3) examined and testified as follows.
(4) EXAMINATION
(5) BY MR. CRAWFORD:
(6) Q: Will you please state your name and spell (8) it for the record.
(9) A: Deborah Killian, D-e-b-o-r-a-h L-y-n-n (10) K-i-l-l-i-a-n.
(11) Q: Deborah, I am William Crawford. I (12) represent James Kay in this matter. You are here (13) pursuant to a subpoena; is that correct?
(14) A: Uh-huh.
(15) Q: I have a copy of the subpoena which we (16) are going to attach to your deposition transcript as (17) Exhibit I, a common procedure.
(18) Have you ever had your deposition taken (19) before?
(20) A: No.

(21) Q: First time?
(22) A: Yes.
(23) (Plaintiff's Exhibit I was marked (24) for identification by the reporter (25) and is attached hereto)

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(1) BY MR. CRAWFORD:
(2) Q: Let me tell you a little bit about it, (3) then. A deposition is a statement made under oath. (4) It bears with it the same force and effect, is under (5) penalty of perjury and stuff like that, as though you (6) are testifying in a courtroom before a judge and a (7) jury. You have the same obligation to tell the (8) truth.
(9) The court reporter you see here to my (10) right is taking down everything that is said in the (11) room since you were sworn and will continue to do so (12) unless we go off the record. Okay? If you just say, (13) "Well, off the record, it is this or that," it will be (14) on the record, okay?
(15) If I say, "Why don't we go off the (16) record" and we agree, then she will stop, okay?
(17) A: Okay.

(18) Q: She is taking down everything that is (19) said and later on it will be transcribed into a (20) booklet form. It reads like a play, page numbers, (21) line numbers and question and answer, question and (22) answer. At some point in time you will get an (23) opportunity to read that deposition transcript; make (24) any changes to your answers; that you deem appropriate, (25) and sign it under penalty of perjury. If you make any

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(1) changes to your answers or have an opportunity to (2) review it and don't make any changes to your answers (3) and later testify differently, it could have an (4) adverse effect upon your credibility.
(5) Do you understand?
(6) A: Uh-huh.
(7) Q: With regard to "uh-huh" and "uh-uh" --
(8) A: Sorry.
(9) Q: Since I just got one, everybody does it. (10) We are used to guttural responses. I know that sounds (11) horrible, but we use them a lot in our day-to-day (12) speech. In a deposition we need to have a clear (13) record, which means we try to not use them because if (14) you do use them, I will say, "Is that a 'yes' or a (15) 'no'?" Okay? Don't be embarrassed if I do, however, (16) because virtually everyone, including lawyers, makes (17) that mistake at some point in time or another.
(18) Further to my point about a clear record, (19) at some point in time you

may be asked for an estimate (20) of time, space, distance, speed, so forth and so on. (21) I am entitled to your best estimate. But I don't want (22) you to guess, okay? The difference between an (23) estimate and a guess is usually pretty clear, but I (24) will give you an example.
(25) You could estimate the length of this

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(1) table, although you would not be able to estimate the (2) length of the table in my living room because you, have (3) never been there and you would not know whether I have (4) a table in my living room or not, okay?
(5) A: Okay.
(6) Q: That would be guessing. (7) But another aspect, I guess, that we (8) should cover here is that the object of a deposition (9) is to have a clear record. So if I ask you a (10) question, I will assume that you understood, the (11) question if you give me an answer. If for any reason (12) you don't understand a question, please ask me to (13) clarify it. I will be glad to. Okay?
(14) A: Okay.

(15) Q: You are entitled to be comfortable during (16) the deposition. We have the air conditioning on. If (17) you need to take a break for any reason, just ask, (18) okay? It is not the Spanish Inquisition, just a walk (19) in the park.
(20) Wait until I complete my question before (21) you answer because that way we don't have two people (22) talking at the same time because it is difficult for (23) the court reporter to take it down if we have two (24) people talking at the same time. Okay?
(25) A: Okay.

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(1) Q: Back to the identification. You stated (2) your name. Could you also please tell me where you (3) reside?
(4) A: I reside at 11452 Acacia Street, (5) Lancaster, California 93535.
(6) Q: Do you have any plans on moving in the (7) near future?
(8) A: Not at the moment.
(9) Q: I meant near future, within the next few (10) months.
(11) A: Uh-huh.
(12) Q: We like to keep track of witnesses. (13) That's why I am asking you that question because if (14) you were thinking about moving to Paris next month, I (15) might do some things differently in this deposition.
(16) At any rate, are you currently employed?
(17) A: No.
(18) Q: Working as a housewife?

(19) A: Yes.
(20) Q: Mother of children?
(21) A: Yes.
(22) Q: Probably keeps you busy. When was the (23) last time that you were employed?
(24) A: July of 1989.
(25) Q: What company was it you were working for

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(1) at that time?
(2) A: Carrier Communications.
(3) Q: What was your position at Carrier?
(4) A: Assistant manager.
(5) Q: What is highest level of formal education (6) that you have had?
(7) A: I am in my junior year of college, (8) majoring in economics.
(9) Q: I, too, was an econ. major -- double (10) major, econ. and econ. studies. Good major.
(11) What were your duties as assistant (12) manager in 1989 at Carrier Communications?
(13) A: I guess you would say more an office (14) assistant rather than a manager. I took care of (15) employees duties, making sure they got to locations (16) they needed to get to, did some accounting, typed up (17) letters, all sorts of things.
(18) Q: General office work from the sound of (19) things?
(20) A: Jack of all trades.
(21) Q: Carrier Communications is a two-way radio (22) business, am I right?
(23) A: Yes.
(24) Q: Have you had any formal training in radio (25) at all?

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(1) A: No.
(2) Q: Are you currently involved with Carrier (3) Communications?
(4) A: No.
(5) Q: Husband works for them, right?
(6) A: That's correct.
(7) Q: Or maybe he owns it?
(8) A: He owns it.
(9) Q: Are you in any position there like the (10) board of directors or hold any position at the company (11) even if it is nominal?
(12) A: I hold no position.
(13) Q: Do you hold any FCC licenses?
(14) A: I believe I hold one.
(15) Q: What do you use that one for?
(16) A: I don't know. I just have my name on the (17) license.
(18) Q: Is that something you did for your (19) husband's business?

(20) A: Yes.
(21) Q: How long have you been married?
(22) A: Ten years.
(23) Q: Congratulations. That's a good record (24) there. I would like to turn right now to the (25) deposition subpoena itself.

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(1) Do you have a copy there?
(2) A: Yes.
(3) Q: Okay. Attached to it is Attachment 3. (4) Now Attachment 3 requests certain books, papers, (5) records, documents, so forth and so on. Why don't we (6) go through the categories of these particular document (7) requests and I am going to ask you a few questions, (8) including whether or not you brought any such (9) documents with you today, whether or not you know the (10) existence of any such documents, and if you do, where (11) they are.
(12) Why don't we start with No. 1. Have you (13) brought any of those documents with you today?
(14) A: No.
(15) Q: Do you know of the existence --
(16) A: No, I do not.
(17) Q: Do me a favor and let me finish my (18) question here.
(19) A: You paused.
(20) Q: I did. You are right. Do you know of (21) the existence of any of the documents requested in (22) No. 1?
(23) A: No.
(24) Q: Why don't I just do this as a preliminary (25) to all these. Have you had an adequate opportunity to

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(1) review Attachment No. 3 in its entirety?
(2) A: I have perused it. I did not know any of (3) the names of these people so I would not have any (4) records. I mean, I don't know these people. I don't (5) have any records of communication for these people.
(6) Q: All right. So do you think you have -- (7) Do you think you have read this in sufficient detail (8) to understand what each of these items is requesting?
(9) A: Yes.
(10) Q: I don't want to go through all of those (11) documents and find out that you did not understand it.
(12) A: Okay.
(13) Q: If you have any questions on any of (14) these, Nos. 1 through 17, feel free to ask me now and (15) I will clarify because sometimes one might help out (16) the other. We will take care of that as kind of a (17) batch, if we can.

(18) A: I don't have access to any of these (19) records.
(20) Q: We will still go through them in a little (21) bit of detail here. Before we do that, I want to ask (22) you one other question. Sometimes people are not (23) feeling as though they can give their best testimony (24) in a deposition for reasons of recent personal trauma, (25) a death in the family, had a car accident on the way

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(1) here, use of drugs or alcohol that still affects them (2) or they are ill for some reason.
(3) Do you feel that you are capable of (4) giving your best testimony as you sit here today?
(5) A: Yes.
(6) Q: Good. The reason you don't have any of (7) those documents is because you don't know who Harold (8) Pick is; is that correct?
(9) A: I have heard of him, but I do not know (10) him.
(11) Q: You have not had any written documents (12) sent to you from Harold Pick, then?
(13) A: No, I have not.
(14) Q: Do me a favor. Let me finish. Sometimes (15) I talk a little bit slow.
(16) So essentially you have not received (17) anything from Harold Pick is what it boils down to in (18) terms of correspondence, letters, cards?
(19) A: I have never received anything from (20) Harold Pick.
(21) Q: No. 3 requests similar things from (22) Annedore Pick. Have you ever received anything from (23) Annedore Pick?
(24) A: No.

(25) Q: No. 4, once again, the same thing with

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(1) anything you have received from Annedore Pick?
(2) A: No.
(3) Q: Do you know who Annedore Pick is?
(4) A: No.
(5) Q: No. 5, essentially any telephone messages (6) that you have got, any kind of other notes or (7) memoranda from Gerard Pick?
(8) A: No.
(9) Q: Is that because you do not know who (10) Gerard Pick is?
(11) A: I do not know Gerard Pick.
(12) Q: You do not know who Gerard Pick is; is (13) that correct?
(14) A: That is correct.

(15) Q: No. 6, once again, from what I understand (16) from you it would be correct for me to say that you (17) don't have any of the items in No. 6 because you have (18) never had any correspondence with Gerard Pick, (19) correct?
(20) A: That's correct.

(21) Q: No. 7, Frank Vito DeMarzo, Frank DeMarzo, (22) and/or CalComm Communications. Do you know who any of (23) those entities are?
(24) A: No.

(25) Q: Ever heard of them before?

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(1) A: No.

(2) Q: Have you ever had any kind of (3) correspondence with them at all?
(4) A: No.

(5) Q: No. 8, do you have any correspondence, (6) letters, cards, or other things that are responsive to (7) this No. 8 from any third parties, including (8) governmental agencies, such as the FCC or others?
(9) A: No.

(10) Q: No. 9, do you have any correspondence, (11) letters, cards or anything else that is responsive to (12) No. 9 that relates to James Kay?
(13) A: No.

(14) Q: You know who James Kay is, though, (15) correct?
(16) A: Yes.

(17) Q: How do you know James Kay?
(18) A: His name has been mentioned at Carrier (19) and then you just introduced him to me.

(20) Q: Okay. So you don't have any of the (21) documents in No. 9; is that correct?
(22) A: Correct.

(23) Q: Have you at any point in time had any of (24) these documents?
(25) A: No.

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(1) Q: As far as you know, then, no documents (2) responsive to No. 9 ever existed; is that correct?
(3) A: That's correct.

(4) Q: Does that go for communications with the (5) FCC?
(6) A: That's correct.

(7) Q: You don't know whether -- you are not (8) aware of any documents responsive to No. 8 ever having (9) existed; is that correct?
(10) A: That's correct.

(11) Q: No. 10, are you aware of any documents (12) that are responsive to No. 10 ever having existed?
(13) A: I am not aware of any of those documents.

(14) Q: No. 11, are you aware of any documents (15) responsive to No. 11 as having ever existed?
(16) A: No.

(17) Q: No. 12, are you aware of the existence of (18) any documents at any point in time responsive to No. (19) 12?
(20) A: No.

(21) Q: No. 13, are you aware of the existence of (22) any documents?
(23) A: No.

(24) Q: So as far as you know, there are no (25) documents ever in existence that regard contacts that

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(1) you made with Harold Pick, Annedore Pick, Gerard Pick (2) or any of the businesses such as Computer Consultants (3) & Systems, Communications Consultants & Systems (4) Century Communications or Charlet Communication & (5) Systems?
(6) A: I am not aware of any documents.

(7) Q: Have you had any -- have you made any (8) contacts with any of those entities, (9) to your (10) knowledge?
(10) A: No.

(11) Q: No. 14, are you aware of the existence of (12) any documents at any point in time that are responsive (13) to No. 14?
(14) A: I am not aware of any documents.

(15) Q: Once again, is that because you don't (16) know who Frank Vito DeMarzo or CalComm Communications (17) is?
(18) A: I have no idea who that man is.

(19) Q: And the same is true for CalComm (20) Communications?
(21) A: That's correct.

(22) Q: No. 15, are you aware of any documents (23) having existed at any point in time that are (24) responsive to No. 15?
(25) A: I am not aware of any of those

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(1) documents.

(2) Q: Are you aware of any documents responsive (3) to No. 16?
(4) A: That would be my permanent telephone (5) records?
(6) Q: Uh-huh.

(7) A: My husband pays our bills out of the (8) office. I don't have any access to the records.

(9) Q: No. 17, do you have any records showing (10) the ownership of Carrier Communications?
(11) A: No, I do not.

(12) Q: Is that, once again, because your husband (13) is in charge of those records?
(14) A: That's correct.

(15) Q: With regard to 16 and 17, did you ask (16) your husband to give you those records?
(17) A: No, I did not.

(18) Q: Talked to him at all about that subpoena?
(19) A: Yes, I talk to him about the subpoena.

(20) Q: Did you show it to him and say, "I need (21) to produce the residential phone records"?
(22) A: No, I did not show it to him.

(23) Q: Do you have any discussion with him about (24) the phone records or the records of ownership?
(25) A: I just said, "I don't have those records"

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(1) and he says, "Well, they are at my office." He has (2) been out of town so I don't have access to the (3) records.

(4) Q: How long has he been out of town?
(5) A: Oh, he has been -- He has been out a lot (6) since the beginning of summer. This recent one has (7) been several weeks. I have not kept track, you know, (8) he is gone a lot.

(9) Q: Do you have access to the business (10) premises?
(11) A: During the day when the employees are (12) there, but I don't have a key to the office.

(13) Q: You can go in when the employees are (14) there; is that correct?
(15) A: Yes.

(16) Q: As far as it goes with regard to these (17) types of records in 16 and 17, are those telephones -- (18) for instance, in No. 16, are those telephones in you (19) and your husband's name?
(20) A: Actually I don't know because I never see (21) the bill.

(22) Q: Do you know if your name appears on the (23) records of ownership for Carrier Communications at (24) all?
(25) A: It does not.

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(1) Q: So as far as you know, the only place (2) your name appears with regard to Carrier (3) Communications is on the one FCC license?
(4) A: That's correct.

(5) Q: Carrier Communications uses that license (6) in the business; is that correct?
(7) A: I don't know.

(8) Q: Do you know if Carrier Communications is (9) a corporation, a partnership, or what type of business (10) entity it is?
(11) A: I know that he is incorporating it.

(12) Whether it has been incorporated yet or not, I don't (13) know.

(14) Q: I understand your husband Chris Killian (15) is also an L.A. Sheriff's reserve officer; is that (16) true?

(17) A: Not anymore. He is retired.

(18) Q: He was at one time?

(19) A: Uh-huh.

(20) Q: Is that a "yes"?

(21) A: Yes.

(22) Q: Don't worry. I told you everybody does (23) it. Relax. This is not the Spanishquisition.

(24) So would it be fair for me to say, then, (25) that you know of the existence of Harold Pick, but

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(1) have you ever met him?

(2) A: You know, I think I was introduced to him (3) at a TCW swap meet back in the early '80s. That's the (4) only recollection I ever have of ever meeting him.

(5) Q: You have never met any of the other Pick (6) family members, to your knowledge, have you?

(7) A: No, not to my knowledge.

(8) Q: Never met any of Harold Pick's rats?

(9) A: Rats? No.

(10) Q: Just curious. It is an important thing (11) in his life. You have never been to Harold Pick's (12) home, have you?

(13) A: No.

(14) Q: I didn't think so or you would know his (15) pet rats. As far as it goes, I understand you have (16) had no formal training in the radio industry; is that (17) correct?

(18) A: That's correct.

(19) Q: As far as the hands-on operation of (20) Carrier Communications goes with regard to radio, you (21) don't really have any interaction with the pieces of (22) gear, hardware, software, do you?

(23) A: I have no involvement.

(24) Q: No involvement with Carrier (25) Communications at all?

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(1) A: No, other than on occasion I have to sign (2) my name on checks when my husband is out of town.

(3) Q: So you are authorized to sign on the (4) company checking account?

(5) A: Yes.

(6) Q: If your husband so directs you, you do?

(7) A: That's correct.

(8) Q: So you have never read of any of the FCC (9) rules, you don't keep around the FCC rule book or (10) anything like that?

(11) A: No, I do not.

(12) Q: Do you ever go into the business at all (13) to help out when someone is sick or anything like (14) that?

(15) A: I have not since 1989.

(16) Q: So then it would be correct for me to (17) state that have you not done any work for Carrier (18) Communications, with the exception of occasionally (19) signing a check, since 1989, true?

(20) A: Yes. I would say that if I am in the (21) office and the phone rings, I will answer it if no one (22) is there. If no one is right at the location, I will (23) answer the phone, but I have not gone in and done work (24) for Carrier since I left in '89.

(25) Q: Did you ever since then -- and I mean

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(1) even from home -- make any phone calls for business (2) purposes on behalf of Carrier Communications from 1989 (3) to the present?

(4) A: No, not to my recollection. I don't (5) believe I have.

(6) Q: What I am talking about, you probably (7) remember if you had made sales calls, for instance?

(8) A: Oh, yes. No, I did not do that. I never (9) have.

(10) Q: If you were given a list of potential (11) customers to contact for any reason, you would (12) remember if you had gone down the list and made a (13) bunch of phone calls, is that true?

(14) A: I would remember that, yes.

(15) Q: You did not do any of that since 1989 at (16) least?

(17) A: No.

(18) Q: It came out backwards on the record. (19) Since 1989, have you made any calls like that of a (20) sales nature and going down a list of customers?

(21) A: No.

(22) Q: Do you know if there is anyone else named (23) Deborah or Debbie or any variant thereof that works (24) for Carrier?

(25) A: Yes, there is a Deborah Whiting.

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(1) Q: What is Deborah's position at Carrier (2) Communications, to the best of your knowledge?

(3) A: To the best of my knowledge, she is a (4) front office receptionist and she coordinates -- (5) put (6) together the sales information given to our companies (6) by various radio companies for our sales people.

(7) Q: Do you know if she is involved in sales (8) at all?

(9) A: I don't know.

(10) Q: Do you know how long she was employed at (11) carrier?

(12) A: I do believe that she was employed (13) shortly after I left in '89. Exactly when, I do not (14) know. I know that she left for maternity leave (15) around -- well, it would be the summer of '92. (16) When she came back, I do not know, but yes, she is (17) back. She is back.

(18) Q: What college are you going to, by the (19) way?

(20) A: I am in the California State Bakersfield (21) program.

(22) Q: Do you know the Dorings at all, Jim (23) Doring?

(24) A: I have heard his name mentioned. I do (25) not know him.

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(1) Q: Can't recall ever having met him?

(2) A: Never have met him.

(3) Q: Linda Doring?

(4) A: I don't know who that is.

(5) Q: Charles Doring?

(6) A: I do not know Charles Doring, who he is.

(7) MR. CRAWFORD: We will go off the record for a (8) minute. I am going to have a little chat with my (9) client.

(10) (Recess)

(11) BY MR. CRAWFORD:

(12) Q: Let's see now. The radio station that we (13) have discussed earlier that is in your name, do you (14) know if anybody manages that particular station?

(15) A: I know nothing about that.

(16) Q: Is you don't know who it is that manages (17) it; correct?

(18) A: That's correct.

(19) Q: You don't know whether or not it is (20) pursuant to a written contract or oral contract; is (21) that correct?

(22) A: That's correct.

(23) Q: You don't know even where the contract (24) is, correct?

(25) A: That's correct.

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(1) Q: You don't know whether or not a contract (2) at all exists; is that correct?

(3) A: That's correct.

(4) Q: Who would know these things?

(5) A: I would imagine my husband, Chris.

(6) Q: If somebody was in possession of any (7) contracts about that particular station and knew where (8) the documents would be, it would be Chris?

(9) A: Chris.

(10) Q: I would imagine from what you know that (11) with regard to that particular station, you don't know (12) whether

it has been constructed, when it has been (13) operated, or any of the details of it?

(14) A: I know no details about it, no.
(15) Q: You don't know whether it has been (16) constructed?
(17) A: I don't know.
(18) Q: You don't know whether or not it is (19) operating; is that correct?
(20) A: That's correct.

(21) Q: What do you know about my client James (22) Kay?
(23) A: I know through the subpoena that he and (24) Harold Pick have some kind of action against each (25) other. What I don't know.

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(1) Q: That is correct.
(2) A: I know that he has a communications (3) company in Los Angeles.
(4) Q: Do you know the name of it?
(5) A: No.

(6) Q: Lucky's Two-Way Radios, the other is (7) Southland Communications. Those are his two business (8) entities as well as the work he does in his own name (9) as James Kay. Have you ever heard anything about (10) either of those two companies, Lucky's or Southland?
(11) A: No.

(12) Q: What have you heard about James Kay, if (13) anything?
(14) A: Just that he is in the communications (15) business in Los Angeles.
(16) Q: Is that all?
(17) A: That's all.

(18) Q: Do you recall being served with the (19) subpoena for this particular deposition?
(20) A: Yes.

(21) Q: Do you recall making any statements to (22) the process server at that time when you were given (23) the subpoena? Do you recall saying anything?
(24) A: I don't recall, no.

(25) Q: It was you that received the subpoena.

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(1) though; is that correct?
(2) A: That's correct.
(3) Q: Was it on or about July 21 of 1996 that (4) you were served?
(5) A: July 21, no.

(6) Q: Do you recall speaking with the process (7) server on or about July 25, 1996 with regard to a (8) subpoena for your husband?

(9) A: I don't know -- I have come across her (10) several times. Whether it was July 21 or not, I don't (11) know.

(12) Q: But does the name Patsy Telles mean (13) anything to you, the process server?
(14) A: No.

(15) Q: But it was a female process server?
(16) A: Yes.

(17) Q: I am going to show a declaration that (18) Patsy Telles provided and just ask you some questions (19) about it. Here. Have a copy.

(20) A: I don't recall statement No. 1. I recall (21) her telling me that other people she has served have (22) stated that to her.

(23) Q: Okay. How about statement No. 2?
(24) A: No. 2, I never made that statement. (25) Gerard Pick, is that Harold's father?

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(1) Q: I believe so.
(2) A: Okay.
(3) Q: That's my knowledge.
(4) A: (told her that I heard Harold Pick's (5) father died of a heart attack.

(6) Q: No. 3?
(7) A: No, I have never made that statement.
(8) Q: No. 4?
(9) A: I don't recall making that statement.

(10) Q: No. 5?
(11) A: No. What I have said to her is that it (12) is pretty convenient for my husband that he has had to (13) be away on construction a lot so he has not been able (14) to be served. That's what I stated to her.

(15) Q: Going back to No. 1, do you have any (16) knowledge from any source whatsoever that would lead (17) you to believe that Mr. Kay is a crook?
(18) A: No.

(19) Q: Do you have any information from any (20) source whatsoever that would lead you to believe --
(21) A: That he is a crook?

(22) Q: Right.
(23) A: No.
(24) Q: To your knowledge, has anyone ever told (25) you that Mr. Kay is a crook?

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(1) A: Not to my knowledge.
(2) Q: Do you have any information from any (3) source that indicates that James Kay caused the death (4) of Harold Pick's father, Gerard Pick?
(5) A: No.

(6) Q: Anybody ever told you that that you can (7) recall?

(8) A: No. I just -- my husband told me that (9) his dad died of a heart attack, and he has told me (10) that Harold Pick's been in a lot of, whatever, suits (11) with James Kay. But that is all I know.

(12) Q: So with regard to the topics here, (13) Nos. 1, 2, 3, 4 and 5 mentioned in this declaration of (14) Patsy Telles -- which we will make a copy of for the (15) court reporter and can be attached as next in order. I (16) believe this is Exhibit 2 to this deposition (17) transcript.

(18) With regard to these statements 1, 2, 3, (19) 4 and 5, the only information that you have that has (20) anything to do with them is the fact that Mr. Kay has (21) been involved in a lot of lawsuits with Harold Pick; (22) is that correct?
(23) A: That's correct.

(24) Q: Does your husband discuss Carrier (25) Communications business with you much at all?

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(1) A: Sometimes, but I would not say a lot.
(2) Q: Has he ever mentioned James Kay's name? (3) They are competitors, as I understand it?

(4) A: I know he is a competitor. I think maybe (5) Chris has had a salesman that has worked for James Kay (6) in the past, but no detail. I prefer not to know (7) anything because it gets in the way of marriage.

(8) Q: Do you know the name of that salesman?
(9) A: Lee? I don't remember his last name.

(10) Q: Lee Willard or Leland Willard?
(11) A: Lee Willard, yes.

(12) Q: Let me explain something to you. We have (13) information from other sources that indicate that (14) someone named Debbie made some phone calls and they (15) were of a business nature related to the radio; (16) industry. After what you have said; I don't suspect (17) that it is you. However, it is our job to eliminate (18) witnesses by process of elimination.

(19) A: Sure.

(20) Q: Now, there are a limited number of ways (21) that we can do this. That's why we ask for telephone (22) records. We can look down and match up and see if any (23) of the numbers that were called by this individual are (24) on those telephone records. However, you don't have (25) those records with you today so it is hard for us to

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(1) completely eliminate you as a witness.
(2) Now, there are a couple of ways we might (3) be able. One is you could bring

them to us at another (4) time or we could get them from the telephone company, (5) which would require your authorization?

(6) A: Okay.

(7) Q: Is there any particular way that you (8) would like to do that?

(9) A: I don't know. I would imagine should (10) consult my attorney on how I should give you records.

(11) Q: My problem is that you are under a legal (12) obligation to produce the records, as your attorney (13) probably told you. You also have a legal obligation (14) to produce ones that you have reasonable access to. (15) You have testified that you have access to the (16) business location, the records and so forth and so on.

(17) A: No, I said I have access to the (18) business. I did not say I have access to the (19) records.

(20) Q: The records, as far as you know, are kept (21) at the business?

(22) A: I don't know where he stores records (23) leading back to January 1991.

(24) Q: I understand. My problem, I need to tie (25) up a loose end. We need to tie up the loose end and

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(1) we are done. There are a number of different ways (2) that we can do that. What we can do then is continue (3) the deposition. It is a legal formality because if I (4) terminate the deposition, that means I am done.

(5) A: Okay.

(6) Q: It means I don't get to go back on (7) anything. Obviously, if we get some records that have (8) a bunch of phone calls made from your place of (9) residence, for instance, or whatever it is, to the (10) numerous people that have told us that they received (11) these calls, then I would have an opportunity to (12) conduct further discovery on that and ask you about (13) those particular conversations and match it up with (14) what the other people have told us already.

(15) The situation effectively then is what we (16) will do is continue the deposition to an unspecified (17) date, and we will deal through your attorney with the (18) production of records in whatever way is most (19) convenient for all of the parties involved. I (20) suppose. You understand I don't really suspect that (21) you are the person that did it, it is just as an (22) attorney and this discovery is an investigative (23) process.

(24) A: Sure.

(25) Q: Which makes me kind of like one of those

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(1) little detective types, that I need to eliminate (2) certain people as suspects. That's a really easy way (3) for me to do it. I don't mean to abuse you or so (4) forth and so on. That is not at all my intent. So (5) with that, we will stipulate this is an agreement that (6) we are making. We will continue the deposition to a (7) date in the future that will be done through your (8) counsel.

(9) That is Patrick Delaney?

(10) A: That's correct.

(11) Q: We will take the matter up with regard to (12) the record production with Mr. Delaney prior to (13) contacting you in this. Now, he is not actually here (14) representing you and it is somewhat awkward when an (15) attorney is representing someone but yet they are not (16) here for them, for these agreements, but I will go (17) through him first and presumably we will be able to work (18) this out with him without me having to contact you (19) directly about it. Okay?

(20) A: Okay.

(21) MR. CRAWFORD: With that, the deposition may be (22) transcribed pursuant to code.

(24) MR. CRAWFORD: After that brief discussion off (25) the record, we have made it very clear that the

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(1) deposition will be transcribed pursuant to Code, (2) which means after it is transcribed, the court (3) reporter's office will notify you and tell you when (4) you can come in and have a look at it, read it over, (5) sign it under penalty of perjury, make any changes, (6) and so forth and so on. Okay?

(7) THE WITNESS: Okay.

(8) MR. CRAWFORD: With that, we are done for now.
