Dear Ms. Dortch:

I write to submit this notice in compliance with Section 1.1206(b) of the Commission's rules.

On November 23, 2010, I met with Dave Grimaldi, Chief of Staff to Commissioner Mignon Clyburn, and Angela Kronenberg, Wireline Legal Advisor.

We discussed the Commission's ongoing efforts to establish open Internet rules. Consistent with our prior filings, I emphasized that paid prioritization schemes to transmit data through broadband Internet access services fundamentally harms the public interest; that an effective rule will protect the use of both wireless and wireline connections; and that any definition of reasonable network management should avoid economic based discrimination by focusing on network engineering, congestion management and public safety.

We discussed the Commission's ongoing review of the transfer of licenses between Comcast, General Electric Company and NBC Universal. Consistent with our prior filings, I underscored that the merger presents a threat to the development of competitive online video distribution services. I reiterated that we believe Comcast perceives online video as a threat to its facilities-based MVPD services, and that NBCU will have increased incentive to limit its online distribution if the merger is approved.
