

DESCRIPTION & JUSTIFICATION INTERSTATE ACCESS TARIFF REVISIONS

Introduction

The Chillicothe Telephone Company (Chillicothe) submits the accompanying access tariff revisions to its Interstate Access Tariff No. 1. Chillicothe proposes to change its tandem switched transport facility and tandem switched transport termination rate from being “blank” to having “N/A”. The proposed change is in section 17.1.1(B)(1) and 17.1.1(B)(2). In addition, Chillicothe proposes to remove the Asymmetrical Digital Subscriber Line regulation from section 8.1 and section 17.4, as well as changing section 8 from “Advanced Communications Networks” to “Reserved for Future Use.”

The description and justification which support the information contained in this filing, is provided below.

Description & Justification

Local Transport

Effective May 10, 2010, Chillicothe added a tandem switched transport section 17.1.1(B) under Local Transport. The rates added were tandem switched facility, tandem switched termination, and tandem switching. At the time, the tandem switching function had active demand and a rate was developed to apply to transiting function the company performs in delivering wireless traffic between the interexchange carrier and the cellular carriers. There was no demand for the tandem switched facility or the tandem switched termination and thus no rate was included (i.e., the rate area was intentionally left blank).

This filing clarifies that no rate exists for the tandem switched facility and tandem switched termination services by adding “N/A” in the monthly rate column.

Asymmetrical Digital Subscriber Line

Per *Appropriate Framework for Broadband Access to the Internet over Wireline Facilities*, Report and Order, CC Docket No. 02-33, FCC 05-150, released September 23, 2005, wireline broadband internet access service providers may offer transmission service on a non-common carrier basis or a common carrier basis. Per paragraph 90, the Federal Communications Commission concluded “...that providers of wireline broadband Internet access service that offer that transmission as a telecommunications service after the effective date of the Order may do so on a permissive detariffing basis. Such providers thus may, in lieu of filing tariffs with the

Commission setting forth the rates, terms, and conditions under which they will provide broadband Internet access transmission service, included those rates, terms, and conditions in generally available offerings posted on their websites.” Therefore, Chillicothe respectfully requests to detariff its asymmetrical digital subscriber line service.
